

called the *triquetra*. It is intended to illustrate the distinct yet inseparable nature of the three persons of the Godhead. Another ancient symbol demonstrated that while none of the three persons of the Godhead are the

other three, all three are "God." While each of these illustrations may have merit, they undoubtedly fail to give us a full and complete picture of the nature of Deity. As Christians what we must do is simple:

- Oppose any teaching about the nature of God (the Father, Son, or Holy Spirit) that is contrary to Scripture. Yet also...
- Affirm that which is revealed in Scripture longing for the day that those things that have not been revealed to us about God's nature may be fully manifested in the second coming of Jesus, our Savior.

God in Three Persons

hen God said, 'Let Us make 1 in Our image, ac-cording to likeness..." (Genesis 1:26 NKJV). Thus begins the record of Deity's conversation with itself regarding the creation of man. This account reveals a staggering and often challenged truth about the God of the



Bible that must be accepted and affirmed—There is One God, composed of three Persons.

Jesus is God

The gospel of John in describing Jesus as the "Word" reveals the very nature of God's Messiah. John 1:1 declares, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."The New World Translation of the Holy Scriptures put out by the Jehovah's Witnesses' Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society denies the impact of these verse, rendering it "the Word was *a god*" (emphasis mine). This is impossible for us to accept in light of the totality of Scripture! Of Jesus the following is clear:


1. The New Testament reveals that creation was accomplished through Jesus, even though the Old Testament always identifies God as the Creator (John 1:3; Hebrews

- 1:2; Colossians 1:16). The logical conclusion we must draw is that Jesus is God.
- 2. Jesus is identified as the "express image" of God (Hebrews 1:3), the "Image of the invisible God" (Colossians 1:15) and One in whom "dwells all the fullness of the Godhead bodily" (Colossians 2:9).
- 3. Scripture refers to Jesus as "God" (John 20:28; Titus 2:13).
- 4. The prophetic name of the Messiah (*Immanuel*) means "God with us" (Matthew 1:23).
- 5. The Old Testament prophesied that the Messiah would be called "Mighty God" (Isaiah 9:6). Thus if we are to accept what Scripture reveals to us we must accept the Deity of Jesus Christ.

The Holy Spirit is a Person

A second fact evident in Scripture is that the Holy Spirit is not simply a manifestation of God or of Jesus but a third person of the Godhead. Consider the following proofs of this fact:

- 1. The Holy Spirit possesses a distinct and separate will from God the Father. When Jesus promised the coming of the Holy Spirit He declared, "...He will not speak on His own authority, but whatever He hears He will speak..." (John 16:13).
- 2. The Holy Spirit is referred to with the masculine pronoun "He." Jesus says, "He will speak" (John 16:13).
- 3. The Holy Spirit could not come until Jesus returned to Heaven. In John 16:7 Jesus said, "...If I do not go




4. In Jesus' baptism the triune nature of Deity was demonstrated: the Son was baptized, the Father spoke from heaven and the Holy Spirit descended upon Jesus like a dove. If the Holy Spirit is not a third person of the Godhead then we see in essence the Father both speaking and descending, which is not what Scripture says (Luke 3:21,22). Thus, if we are to accept what Scripture says we must accept that the Holy Spirit (like Jesus) is God, but a distinct person from God the Father.
